# Jonah

- 1. Perhaps the most well-known of all the "minor prophets"
- 2. This book doesn't focus as much on the prophecy, but upon the story of the prophet himself.
- 3. We don't know much about Jonah beyond the account given here. But other writers of scripture give credence to the account.
  - A. A prophet during the reign of Jeroboam II of Israel (**2 Kg. 14:25**)
  - B. From Gath Hepher (2 Kg. 14:25)
  - C. Jesus makes reference to the sign of Jonah (3 days and 3 nights in the belly of the great fish and to Nineveh and their response (c.f. Matt. 12:39-42)
- 4. One of the books where the chapter divisions seem to break up the story nicely.
  - A. Chapter 1 Running Away From God
  - B. Chapter 2 Running To God
  - C. Chapter 3 Running With God
  - D. Chapter 4 Running Ahead of God
- 5. Consider the story of Jonah and draw some observations and lessons for us today.

### Discussion:

## I. RUNNING AWAY FROM GOD

- A. Outline of the Chapter:
  - 1. Jonah receives a commission from God (1:1-2)
  - 2. Jonah attempts to flee from the presence of God (1:3)
  - 3. The Lord responds to Jonah (1:4-17)
    - a. The Lord sent "a great wind" on the sea (:4-16)
    - b. The Lord prepared "a great fish" to swallow Jonah (1:17)
- B. Observations/Lessons
  - 1. (1:1-2) Jonah's commission go to Nineveh and cry out against it (we see later the purpose was to give them a chance to repent and escape the wrath of God)
  - 2. Nineveh capital city of Assyria, roughly 500 miles NE of Joppa/Gath Hepher
  - 3. (1:3) Tarshish = located somewhere in Spain on the opposite side of the Mediterranean Sea Jonah went in the complete opposite direction to flee
  - 4. (1:4) We cannot flee from the presence of God (c.f. Ps. 139:7-12)
  - 5. (1:5-16) Both Jonah and the sailors come to realize that it is God's hand which caused the storm due to Jonah's disobedience
    - a. Jonah realizes what is happening (c.f. 1:9, 12)
    - b. The sailors soon see the power of God and end up worshiping Him (c.f. 1:5-6, 10, 14-16)
  - 6. (1:17) God has a purpose for Jonah and He makes provision to save Jonah that it may be accomplished sends a great fish to swallow Jonah
    - Jonah there for 3 days/nights used as a "sign" by Jesus concerning what would happen to Him (c.f. Matt. 12:39-40)

# II. RUNNING TO GOD

- A. Outline of the Chapter:
  - 1. Jonah's Prayer to God (2:1-9)
  - 2. The Lord's response: deliverance (2:10)
- B. Observations/Lessons:
  - 1. (2:1-2) Jonah recognizes the Lord is the only one He can turn to to hear him

- 2. (**2:3**) He recognized the Lord had cast him into the deep
- 3. (2:4-7) Jonah turned to the Lord and the Lord had responded
- 4. (2:8-9) Jonah's prayer is marked by thanksgiving, even more than petition
  Even in distress, our prayers, too, should be those of thanksgiving to God (c.f. Phil. 4:6-7)
- 5. (**2:10**) The Lord spoke to the fish He had prepared and it delivered Jonah to dry ground

## **III. RUNNING WITH GOD**

- A. Outline of the Chapter:
  - 1. The Lord repeats His commission to Jonah (3:1-2)
  - 2. Jonah chooses to obey this time and goes to Nineveh (3:3-4)
  - 3. The people of Nineveh from the least to greatest repent (3:5-9)
  - 4. God acknowledges their repentance and spares them (3:10)
- B. Observations/Lessons:
  - (3:1-2) God's command remains unchanged. Jonah's disobedience did not alter God's message/plan (c.f. 1:1-2)
  - 2. (3:3-4) The simplicity of Jonah's message, yet urgent
  - 3. (3:5-6) From the greatest to the least, they responded to the message in a genuine way, even the King
  - 4. (**3:7-10**) Another lesson in repentance
    - Repentance is seen through their works (actions), not just their words (:10a) (c.f. Mt. 3:8 (john the baptist to the Pharisees); Acts 26:19-21 (Paul concerning His preaching))
    - They responded with:
      - Fasting (<mark>:7</mark>)
      - Putting on sackcloth (:8a)
      - Praying to God (:8b)
      - Turning away from their sins (:8c)
      - If perhaps God might turn away from His wrath (:9) (c.f. Joel 2:12-14)
      - The Lord upholds them as an example of repentance and those who will stand to condemn the unfaithful in the judgement (c.f. Matt. 12:41-42)
  - (3:10) even the most wicked of men can repent and turn to the Lord (c.f. 1 Cor. 6:9-11; Saul/Paul;) – we see what happens when Jonah got out of his own way and went to declare God's message to this wicked and cruel nation – they turned to the LORD!

### **IV. RUNNING AHEAD OF GOD**

- A. Outline of the Chapter:
  - 1. Jonah's Anger and God's rebuke (4:1-4)
    - a. Jonah so angry he would rather die (4:1-3)
    - b. God's rebuke: "Is it right for you to be angry?" (4:4)
  - 2. The Lord Teaches Jonah a Lesson Using a plant, a worm, and an east wind (4:5-11)
- B. Observations/Lessons:
  - (4:1-3) Jonah fled because he didn't want God's message to work and Nineveh to be spared he was exhibiting a sectarian spirit (schismatic, clannish, racist) and didn't want these foreigners to receive God's mercy.
    - Had a similar reaction to the older brother of the prodigal son (c.f. Lk. 15:11-32)
    - How the Pharisees responded to Jesus' eating with sinners (Mt. 9:10-11)
    - His prayer here is really the opposite of his prayer in ch. 2 there requesting and thanking

God for His lovingkindness and saving His life – here wishing God would take his life because of that same loving kindness shown this time to Nineveh!

- 2. (4:4) Lord's simple response Jonah should have known answer
- 3. (4:5-11) God uses a plant, worm, and wind to rebuke Jonah
  - a. (4:5) Jonah goes just outside the city to see what happens to the city perhaps hoping for it to fall
  - b. (4:6-8) God sends a plant as shade, and then removed it with a worm and sends a strong east wind Jonah a second time wishes death for himself
  - c. (4:9) God asks again if its right for him to be angry and a third time he wishes for death
  - d. (**4:10-11**) God shows Jonah that he had more pity on a plant than for a nation and its children and livestock.

Conclusion:

- 1. Hopefully we learn some important lessons from the account of Jonah's commission to Nineveh
- 2. Beware of prejudice toward our audience and don't allow petty reasons to keep us from our responsibilities as God's people!
- 3. Don't be selfish and narrow-minded in sharing the gospel.
- 4. Be concerned for all souls, even those of wicked men that might turn to the Lord (again consider Saul and the Corinthians)
- 5. Just as with Nineveh, judgement will come, and we must be ready. Repent of sin and turn to God.
- 6. Consider once more the words of Jesus: "*The men of Nineveh will rise up in the judgement with this generation and condemn it, because they repented at the preaching of Jonah; and indeed a greater than Jonah is here.*" (Matt. 12:41)
